



For the first week of life

A parent's guide

Is your newborn baby well?

A healthy newborn:

- has pink lips and a pink tongue
- has an underarm temperature between 36.8°C and 37.3°C, similar to yours
- passes urine (wee) and opens their bowels (poo) regularly
- feeds often, 8 to 12 times in 24 hours
- is quietly alert when awake and reacts to sounds and voices
- breathes a little faster than you with some short pauses
- shows signs when they're struggling and need help, like changing colour, crying, wriggling or trembling.

Is your newborn baby sick?

If your baby:

- stops breathing or turns blue
- has a seizure, with twitching or jerking movements of the eyes, mouth, arms or legs
- can't be woken
- doesn't notice loud noises, a bright light shining in their eyes or a gentle pinch on the arm.

Within the first week of life

If your baby:

- has yellow looking skin in the first 24 hours after birth
- hasn't fed for more than 6 hours after the first 24 hours
- hasn't had at least 1 wet and 1 dirty nappy a day after the first 24 hours
- has twitchy or jerky eye, mouth, arm or leg movements
- seems limp or floppy in the body, head, neck, arms and legs
- is breathing very fast and making grunting noises
- has an unusual cry - like a weak, high-pitched, moaning or painful cry
- has blood in their poo
- has very pale skin or is turning yellow
- their stomach (tummy) or the bottom of their chest draws in when they breathe
- is vomiting a lot - more than half the feed after each of the last 3 feeds.
- the vomit is not clear, milky or pale yellow
